 - 1. Not paying attention to progress of the police line
 - 2. Trapped in a violent crowd
 - 3. In fear of their own safety

1. AB48, PC 13652- Kinetic energy projectiles/Chemical agents shall only be used under specific conditions by trained Officers/Deputies

 - 1. The Baton (used for crowd control)
 - a. Reporting Requirements

 - 2. Less-lethal Impact Munitions
 - a. 37mm / 40mm / Bean Bag /Pepper Ball
 - b. Reporting Requirements, PC 12525.2- Agency report to DOJ

when OIS or UOF resulting in GBI or death occurs

- c Medical Treatment
- 3. Chemical Agents
- 4. All Other Less Lethal Munitions
- C. No exception to law or policy regarding "use of force" during crowd control situations
- D. The Legal Standard
 - 1. "Objectively Reasonable"
 - a. Established by the Supreme Court
 - 2. Must be based on the facts known to the officer at the time
 - 3. Force must be reasonable based on the situation
 - 4. Based on totality of circumstances
 - 5. Judged from perspective of a reasonable officer at the scene
- E. Law Enforcement Policy in General
- F. Authorized Use of Force
 - 1. Compel a person to comply with directions
 - 2. Overcome resistance during an arrest or detention
 - 3. Defend from aggressive action
- G. Unauthorized/Excessive Force
 - 1. Force disproportionate to resistance
 - 2. Unreasonable based upon the circumstances

- I. Crowd Control-Baton Use (proposed)

- 1. Standard Use of Force Report not required
- 2. When OfficersUse a Baton as an extension of their hand intended to control or move the crowd (Passive Push)
- J. Supervisor's Log-Crowd Control (proposed)
- K. OC Spray:
 - 1. Authorized for general field operations
 - 2. Uncooperative individual behavior
 - 3. Not for Crowd Dispersal
- L. Taser:

- 1. Authorized for general field operations
- 2. Violent/potentially violent *individual* behavior
- 3. Not for Crowd Dispersal
- M. CS (Tear Gas)
 - 1. Targeted toward those *Individuals* engaged in violent acts
 - 2. Not for overall area denial, general use
- N. Medical Treatment / First Aid Required
 - Any arrestee taken into custody
 - a. With evidence of injury
 - b. Before Booking process
 - 2. Any subject claiming injury as result of force application
- O. Document "Officer Injuries" and complete required crime report (s)
